Upon graduation, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the key concepts and theories of the major perspectives of psychology (biological, developmental, social, and clinical psychology).
- 2. Demonstrate acquired knowledge gained in their psychology classes to practical situations through various written, oral, and/or role playing assignments.
- 3. Effectively communicate psychology course material orally and in written format.
- 4. Use information from scholarly articles to support a claim in a written assignment.
- 5. Know when to use various research methods (e.g., study design, data collection, data entry) and measurement techniques (e.g., use of surveys, observational methods), including statistical analyses.
- 6. Differentiate between inferential and descriptive statistics and use each in their proper context.
- 7. Initiate, design, conduct and report an empirically-based research project under appropriate supervision.
- 8. Articulate the moral and ethical codes of professional conduct.
- 9. Demonstrate computer literacy in database and statistical software through lab assignments and the capstone research project.
- 10. Identify personal strengths and weaknesses, and develop a plan for personal improvement.
